Palliative care is an internationally recognised speciality focused on caring for people with life limiting and life-threatening conditions and the people important to them.

This two day workshop has been designed for experienced clinicians to provide an opportunity to debate contemporary challenges in providing palliative care.

In addition to opportunities to discuss clinical care, the workshop will examine the contribution of clinical leadership, education in practice and current innovations in research, to future development of palliative care services.

The workshop will employ a range of discussion activities, as well as provide opportunities to hear from international experts.

To facilitate discussion workshop places will be limited to a maximum number of 20 participants.

The workshop will be held at the University of Southampton School of Health Sciences. Refreshments and lunch will be provided.

The workshop will enable you to:

- Critically consider contemporary palliative care and the implications this raises for the provision of care to people facing life-threatening and life-limiting conditions;
- Reflectively examine your role in palliative care with respect to providing clinical care, leading service provision, facilitating other's practice and contributing to research;
- Develop a global understanding of palliative care and palliative care services.
